

# P:

# E:

- Do you think James should have taken the bag? Why?

# R:

- Who comes out of the bushes?
- What did the man take out of his pocket?
- What did the man's breath smell of?
- What was in the bag?

# S:

- Why did people pay to see the peach?
- Why didn't the aunts let James stay around the peach?

# Chapters 11 and 12

- How is a slither different from a walk?
- Define 'withering'.

# I:

- What was terrifying about the creatures?
- When the creatures announce their hunger, why is James scared?
- Why do the creatures laugh at James?
- Why does it take the centipede hours to take off his boots?

### P:

- Predict what James and the creatures will get up to.

# E:

- What's funny about 'pulling the earthworm's leg'?

### R:

- Who was in the peach?
- How big was the grasshopper?
- How many legs does the centipede actually have?
- What does the grasshopper classify himself as?
- How did the creatures end up this way?

# S:

- Describe the creatures in one word.
